

Y1 Autumn Term 2018 Curriculum Overview



Religious Education

Values & Virtues

This term **virtue and values** are **Compassionate and loving** and **faith-filled and hopeful**. The children will explore the meanings of these through their own actions, assembly and lessons during the term.

Creation:

During this unit the children will learn to develop appreciation of themselves and the world around them as part of God's creation. They will spend time reflecting and thanking God for his many gifts.

Families and Celebrations:

Children will develop their knowledge and understanding of what it means to belong and celebrate family. We will focus on the stories that celebrate the life of the Church and Jesus.

Advent:

Throughout Advent, the children will learn that this is a time for waiting and preparing for the celebration of both, the birth of Jesus and his coming again.

Christmas:

We will develop an understanding of the importance of Christmas as a celebration of the birth of Jesus and how it impacted on others.

English

Class Texts:

For the first half term we will be reading and writing about:

- The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson
- Handa's Surprise by Eileen Browne

During the second half term we will share:

- You wouldn't want to be in the trenches in world war one by Alex Woolf
- Monkey Puzzle by Julia Donaldson
- Mog the Forgetful Cat by Judith Kerr
- The Jolly Christmas Postman by Janet and Allan Ahlberg

Reading (comprehension):

Children will be asked questions about the texts we read during English and also during Guided Reading, where they will develop skills to understand a text and will be encouraged to:

- Say what they like and dislike about a text.
- Check that their reading makes sense and go back to correct when it doesn't.
- Make links to their own experiences.
- Make predictions about the events in the text.
- Draw inferences on the text.
- Explain what the text is about.

Range of Writing:

Across the term, children will attempt to write in the style of fiction and non-fiction.

- Descriptive writing
- Recount
- Instructions
- Story writing

Composition:

During this term, children will:

- Compose a sentence orally before writing it
- Sequence sentences in chronological order to recount an event or experience
- Leave spaces between words
- Re-read writing to check for sense

Vocabulary, grammar and punctuation:

To be a writer in Year One, children will begin to independently:

- Use finger spaces
- Use capital letters and full stops
- Use a question mark
- Join two sentences using 'and'

Spelling:

We are learning Phase 5 (of the Letter and Sounds phonics programme) where we are learning more than one way to represent a sound:

<p>Mathematics</p> <p><u>Recall of number facts for +, -, x and ÷ :</u> The children will begin to develop a secure knowledge and quick recall of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Adding and subtracting one to numbers up to 100 • Addition and subtraction within ten • Number bonds to ten <p><u>Place Value:</u> We will study the value of digits – tens and units. Children will be able to count from any given number up to 100. They will read and write numbers up to 20 and begin to find one more and one less than a number.</p> <p><u>Addition and Subtraction:</u> Children will begin to recognise symbols for addition and subtraction and write their own number sentences for addition and subtraction facts to 10. We will then look at the link between number bonds to 10 and 20.</p> <p><u>Multiplication and Division:</u> Children will begin to count in twos, fives and tens. We will use arrays and number patterns to support their understanding.</p> <p><u>Fractions:</u> Children will be taught to recognise that a half is two equal parts and that the two equal parts can be combined to make a whole.</p> <p><u>Measurement:</u> Children will compare and describe length and height. They will become familiar with the vocabulary used to describe this and begin to measure using both non-standard units of measure and rulers.</p> <p><u>Geometry (properties of shapes):</u> Children will focus on naming 2D shapes and their properties in different orientations and sizes.</p> <p>Problem solving will be embedded throughout each unit.</p>
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<p>Science</p>	<p><u>Our Changing World:</u> We will be looking at how plants, animals and the weather change during the year by carrying out frequent observations in our natural environment.</p> <p><u>Using our Senses:</u> To link with our Topic work we are learning about our senses. Children will develop their knowledge and understanding of the human body. They will be able to name simple parts of the body. Children will explore how each sense is linked to particular parts of their body as they answer scientific questions based on first hand experiences. Children will collect and organise data and we will begin to summarise our findings.</p> <p><u>Everyday Materials:</u> In our next module children will develop their knowledge and understanding of basic materials and their properties. They will learn to identify and name materials and be able to identify objects that are made by these. The children will recognise that a material can be used to make an object; they will apply their knowledge of senses to decipher this.</p>
<p>Computing</p>	<p><u>Mini-Artists:</u> Children will use the web safely to find ideas for an illustration. They will select and use appropriate painting tools to create and change images on the computer. The children will develop an understanding of how the use of ICT differs from using paint on paper. They will learn how to save their work and retrieve it.</p> <p><u>Data Magicians</u> We will be looking at how to group things using technology and how to represent different forms of information.</p> <p><u>E-Safety:</u> Children will learn about how to be safe around technology. Children will learn to use technology safely and responsibly, keeping personal information private and identifying where to go for help and support when they have any concerns.</p>
<p>P.E.</p>	<p><u>Gymnastics</u> This term children will master basic movements, develop their balance and coordination. They will aim to extend movements in patterns and sequences.</p> <p><u>Dance</u> Children will perform simple movements, learn to use different parts of the body to imitate and lead movements and create short dances either individually or with a partner.</p>
<p>P.S.H.E.</p>	<p>Children will celebrate their differences and special qualities as they start a new year. They will discuss fears and feelings that will allow them to deal with difficult situations. They will learn to share their thoughts and recognise decisions that are right and wrong.</p>

	<p>Multi faith Study: We will be studying festivals from different faiths. Our focus will be Sikhism where we will learn about Diwali (November 7th). The children will learn about the festival, and listen to the story of Rama and Sita!</p>
Foundation Subjects	<p>Our themes for this term are 'Marvellous Me' and World War One.</p> <p>Art: Children will create lines of different thicknesses using a pencil to make a self-portrait. They will learn the primary and secondary colours and use these to colour areas on a map.</p> <p>Design and Technology: We will make a fruit salad, describe the taste of food and consider different materials when creating items for specific purposes.</p> <p>Geography: We will use a map to locate the different areas around school. We will also look at the local area we live in. Considering what we like to do in our area and how we would improve it. The children will compare a hot country to a cold country.</p> <p>History: Children will learn about life at war. They will learn about what it was like in the trenches and compare their family lives to others, focusing on schooling and home life. We will focus on the importance of the poppies and what they represent. As part of this topic, children will make a bravery medal, listen to music from 1910 and compare how music has changed then and now.</p> <p>Music: Children will speak, sing and chant along with music and well-known songs.</p>

Homework Arrangements:

English	This may consist of a punctuation and grammar piece or a recount of your child's weekend where they can apply the basic skills (see 'vocabulary, grammar and punctuation'). This will be sent out on a Friday .
Mathematics	This will be based on the work that the children have been learning in school. This will be sent out on a Friday .
Spelling	These will be sent out on a Monday and the children will be tested on a Friday .
Number Facts	Mentally adding and subtracting one to numbers up to 100 and quick recall of number bonds to 10. These will be tested on a Thursday .

Home Reading:

Please read with your child regularly - every night if time allows! Reading books will be changed **at least** once a week. Your child will receive a sticker on their bookmark if they have read **three or more times in the week**, which will later result in a certificate when it is full. Reading records and books should be in school every day and signed by an adult.

Please ensure that all items of clothing and personal equipment is labelled, as if items go missing it is easier to return to owner. Please check book bags daily in case any letters have been sent home that day.
