DAY 3	Spelling – Words which end with –cious, -tious, -cial and –tial	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Copy down each word twice Cover the words, write them and check them. (x2)
DAY 4	Brazilian Dance – reading comprehension	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Carefully read the question Mark key words Look for those words in the text and words with similar meanings Answer the question.
DAY 5	Grammar – using modal verbs	Modal verbs are used to indicate how likely something is to happen. E.g. 'will' is more likely than 'might'.

Usernames and logins have been put inside the homework books. 15 minutes per day should also be spent on Times Tables Rockstars (see homework book for login details). This is because they are a great deal older. Most of the rocks that make up the Cambrian Mountains of Wales are around 400 million years old compared with the rocks of the Himalayas, which are around 55 million years old.
