RESEARCH Geography - Temperatures across the UK Climate is the average pattern of the weather that a place receives over 30 years. We can't make generalisations about weather conditions from one day to the next, but we can when we average out what happens over a much longer time frame. When we measure average weather conditions in a place over 30 years, we can then begin to describe its climate. In comparison to many other places in the world, the United Kingdom is a small country: we have what is called a temperate climate. However, this does not mean that the climate (average weather conditions) is the same in every place. Even in a small country,

the climate of one place can be very different to the climate of another.

Explore the temperatures found across the UK in January and July in resource 1. You can then use resource 2 to find out which areas these temperatures are found in. Finally, use resource 1 and 2 to complete the tables to show which temperatures are experienced in which area of the UK.


