Parent Consultation Appointments:

This term's parent consultation meetings will be taking place in the school hall on Monday 4th and Wednesday 6th March between 3.30pm and 5.45pm. Our classrooms will be open for you to view your child's work. We will write to all parents with further details, including appointment times, shortly. Please remember that these meetings are for parents and teachers only: there is no provision for children to be supervised at school. We therefore ask you NOT to bring children back into school on these evenings.

Message from Vaccination UK for parents regarding the MMR Vaccination Outbreak Response:

Vaccination UK have been instructed by NHSE to administer the MMR vaccination to all school aged children who are outstanding one or both doses. The MMR would have been given at the age of 1 year and the second dose at 3 years and 4 months. There has been an outbreak of Measles in the West Midlands which have been on the rise within the last few weeks. If your child is outstanding one or both doses of the MMR, please contact their office on 0121 592 1110 to make an appointment. This will be at an alternative venue and NOT at the school.

Number Fact of the Week:

One of the precepts of being a Catholic is to attend Sunday Mass (or the vigil Mass for Sunday) every week and on all Holy Days of Obligation. This weekly commitment gives us the opportunity to celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord which is why Sundays are known as the Lord's day.

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year B)

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

In this Sunday's gospel Simon's mother-in-law is sick. She has a fever and is in bed. Jesus arrives at the house, takes her by the hand and helps her out of bed. Immediately she feels better.

Later that day lots of people who were ill came

to the place where Jesus was. Some of them may have travelled a long way. Jesus helps them all, curing them and making them feel better.

What does this story tell us about Jesus? How does he heal the people that come to him?

When was the last time that you were sick?

How did you feel?

Who helped you and made you feel better? What did they do to make you feel better?

Sometimes when we are sick we have to see a doctor or go to the hospital. How long does it take to get from your house to the doctors?

In some countries around the world people have to travel a very long way to see a doctor. This is very difficult, especially when they are ill. How do you think this makes them feel? How do you feel when you hear this?

Jesus healed all those who came to him for help. Although we cannot heal people the way Jesus did, we can help them by making sure that wherever they are in the world, they are able to reach a doctor, or that the doctor can reach them, and that they get the medicine that they need. How do you think we can do this?

help us all to follow Jesus' example of loving care and healing, and to treat all those who are ill with care and tenderness.
